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## Can you share more about your role within Transport & Mobility Leuven and your current priorities and research focuses?

I am a researcher at Transport & Mobility Leuven. Here is a list of some of my current focuses:

- Supporting and evaluating the impact of the mobility measures from the Belgian federal climate policy on transport and mobility.
- Supporting the evaluation and the implementation of sustainable mobility measures in Antwerp, Madrid, and Turku, in the European SCALE-UP project
- Contributing to the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) for the discipline 'mobility' of the eastern part of the Brussels Ring R0
- Conducting mobility impact study of a new construction project in Hasselt

## In your eyes, how have users' expectations of mobility and MaaS changed over the past few years, particularly as we emerge post-covid?

Absolutely, there has been a change in mobility behaviour post-covid:

- Positively: More cyclists and micro-mobility users in cities during the covid and post-covid period thanks to (temporary) changes in urban spaces in favour of active modes.
- Negatively: Fear to take public transport and more car commuters.

In terms of expectations of users: In cities, we expect to be able to use different modes in a flexible way, with one click on our phone. However, MaaS is in many places not up-to-date yet, or at least the ticketing isn't.

# What should we prioritize in order to make mobility, particularly active mobility, an attractive and more widespread option for users?

The priorities should be more and safer infrastructure for active modes. This should be combined with measures to reduce car use (road pricing, car parking policy, secured parking for cyclists,...).

Can you elaborate on the role of cooperation in facilitating mobility, particularly cooperation between actors at different levels (mobility providers, public transport authorities, governments, etc.)?

In so few words, it's very important to the success of mobility; governance and collaboration between stakeholders. The different partners should have or define the same objectives and strive for a common goal (safe and clean mobility, and liveability in urban areas), work as a team, instead of each stakeholder/partner only defending its own goals.

At Rail Live, you are presenting Transport & Mobility Leuven's research into active travel and how this can pair with rail for sustainable first and last-mile options. Can you briefly expand on this topic?

We will present the results of the European BiTiBi project on how to combine bike and rail travel, presenting first and last-mile solutions, based on case studies in different European cities.

#### What does the future of mobility look like? Where do you see the industry heading in the next 5 years?

I think there will be a strong focus on multi-modality, shared mobility, MaaS platforms, adapted car parks for electric vehicles, and a general huge focus on technology.
